Description: Consistent with the prescribed curriculum guidelines of the Diocese of Monterey for Computer And Technologies and conforming to Good Shepherd's Curriculum (revised Spring 2006), this course will focus on the continued development of elementary skills of technologies and computers that will allow students to succeed in academia and life. Areas of concentration will include; typing skills, simple word processing, beginning effective internet searches, and the use of technology in completing assignments in other critical areas of study.

Objectives.

The student will demonstrate the qualities of an Active Christian who:

- values the teachings of Jesus and demonstrates them by showing respect to the teacher and their classmates.
- knows and honors Catholic doctrine
- appreciates that other people, cultures and nature are all a part of God's creation
- understands and utilizes the elements of technology in a thoughtful, safe and respectable way

The student will develop the necessary awareness and knowledge of computers and technology to become a Life Long Learner who:

- has awareness of and utilizes "Proper Hand Position" while typing.
- can utilize word processing programs and features to compose and complete writing assignments.
- demonstrates the ability to utilize the internet for conducting research.
- works cooperatively with others, demonstrating tolerance and respect

The student is a Globally Aware Individual who:

- uses technology to learn more about the world around us.
- develops the skills to communicate with others and appreciate their differences.
- integrates computer skills to advance knowledge in other subject areas.

Materials.

Dell Computers, keyboards, mouse and head phones.

Windows Operating System XP.

A variety of age appropriate, educational programs and applications, including (but not exclusive to); *Magic School Bus Solar Systems, Chuck Wagon Bill, Zoombinis, That Spelling Is Right?, Super Science Show, Faces and Places, Reading For Meaning, Type To Learn, Oregon Trail, Microsoft Word, Microsoft Power Point, and others.*

Online resources, handouts and supplemental publications.

External storage devices may be necessary.

*All technological related materials listed above are provided for use by all students in the Good Shepherd School Computer Lab, with the possible exception of the external storage devices. Allowances can be made when necessary. Though it is highly recommended that students have their own external storage devices, should saving work be necessary for use elsewhere.

Requirements & Assignments.

There are 4 categories of requirements weighted as follows:

Class Work	50%
Conduct	20%
Effort	20%
Exams/Quizzes	10%

When assigned, projects of larger magnitude and/or effort may be assessed according to a test or participation grade.

Where appropriate students will provide me with a self-assessment of their participation and effort before formal grades are distributed periodically (progress reports and report cards). They may be asked also to provide self-assessments on other assignments throughout the year. For projects and some class work activities students may be asked to assess one another.

Participation grades should reflect active listening and contribution to class discussions. Students do not have to be right when they share with the class, but their comments should reflect critical thinking and healthy reflection.

For most special assignments and projects, rubrics will be provided to students on the day a project is announced, so as to provide them a clear set of expectations on how the assignment is to be assessed and evaluated (graded). Adequate time will be provided to complete individual and group projects.

Grading In accordance with the Good Shepherd Family Handbook students in grades 3, 4 and 5 will be assessed as follows:

B= GOOD
C= SATISFACTORY
D= IMPROVEMENT NEEDED
F= UNSATISFACTORY

Late Work Policy:
